The following areas are free for sightseeing and exploring. Note that some elements of each venue may include a fee or charge. Each chapter is responsible for making their own plans and arrangements. Be sure to carefully check hours of operations and fees for any optional activities you would like to visit. Each chapter is responsible for their own supervision and lifeguarding at venues near water. Students should not be allowed to go swimming.

La Jolla Shores. Play football with your friends or walk along the La Jolla Shores and keep your eye out for vivid sea life such as kelp fields, dolphins, many species of birds, or leopard sharks. La Jolla beach is home to one of the nation's most beautiful ecological reserves. After your time on the beach, wonder the shops and restaurants in this beautiful community. If you are lucky, you just might catch a glimpse of Mrs. Dr. Seuss driving her gray Cadillac with the license plate "GRINCH."
